The following are general rules for the most common citation situations. For more information, please see the [American Anthropological Association](#) style guide.

Citation in Text

- The development of fried bananas caused chaos in the village (Brown 1938).
- The development of fried bananas caused chaos in the village (Brown 1938b).
- The development of fried bananas caused chaos in the village (Brown and Little 1938).
- The development of fried bananas caused chaos in the village (Brown, Little and Johnston 1938). [(Brown, et al. 1938) thereafter]
- The development of fried bananas caused chaos in the village (Brown 1938:384).
- The development of fried bananas caused chaos in the village (Brown 1938:384-386).
- According to Cecil Brown, the development of fried bananas caused chaos in the village (1938:384).
- Cecil Brown states, "the development of fried bananas caused chaos in the village" (1938:384).
- The development of "fried bananas caused chaos in the village" (Brown 1938:384).
- The development of "fried bananas caused chaos in the [Mandobo] village" (Brown 1938:384).

Citation in Sources Cited

The author(s) name(s) are not indented. The first line of the reference (starting with year) should be indented five spaces and each line of the reference thereafter should be indented ten spaces. Title the final page of the paper 'Sources Cited' in bold and centered. List sources in alphabetical order by author. If there is more than one source per author, list each author's publication in order by date, the oldest first. If there are two or more publications in one year for one author, append a lowercase number to the date (e.g., 1999a and 1999b) with the 'a' being listed first.
